SCHOOL PROFILE

Hesperia Unified School District is located in the high desert region of San Bernardino County, approximately 40 miles north of the Ontario/San Bernardino valley. More than 20,000 students in grades kindergarten through twelve receive a rigorous, standards-based curriculum from dedicated and highly qualified professionals. The district is comprised of 15 elementary schools, 2 sixth grade academies, 3 middle schools, 2 comprehensive high schools, 1 alternative school, 2 continuation high schools, 1 community day school, and 6 charter schools.

Hollyvale Elementary is the only school in the district located in the Victorville city limits, west of the Interstate 15 freeway and south of Bear Valley Road in the Sunset Ridge area. At the beginning of the 2007-08 school year, 636 students in grade kindergarten through six were enrolled, including 5.00% in special education, 24.00% qualifying for English learner support, and 58.00% qualifying for free or reduced-price lunch. Hollyvale Elementary achieved a 2008 Academic Performance Index (API) score of 786 and met all 2008 Adequate Yearly Progress criteria.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2007-08)

SCHOOL FACILITIES & SAFETY

Hollyvale Elementary provides a safe, clean environment for learning through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Original school facilities were built in 1994; ongoing maintenance and modernization efforts ensure school facilities are kept safe and in good working condition and continue to provide adequate space for students and staff. CAMPUS SUPERVISION

As students arrive on campus each morning, administrators greet students at the entrance gate, one proctor monitors activities in the cafeteria during breakfast, and three proctors are stationed on the playground. During recess, teachers are on the playground to monitor behavior and activities. Four proctors provide supervision during the lunch recess and monitor both cafeteria and playground activities. At the end of the day, teachers escort students to bus areas, on-campus after-school programs, and student pickup areas. One administrator is on duty in the bus area and one administrator supervises the student pickup area to ensure students leave campus in a safe and orderly manner.

CAMPUS MAINTENANCE

The custodial staff and district's maintenance department take great pride in Hollyvale Elementary's beautiful campus and work together to ensure playgrounds, classrooms, and campus grounds are well-maintained and kept safe and functioning for students, staff, and visitors. The principal and custodians communicate daily regarding maintenance issues and special projects. Hand-held walkie-talkies enhance two-way communication efforts and help facilitate an immediate response to emergency situations. The custodian, proctors, teachers conducting physical education instruction, the school office, administrators, and after-school program director carry hand-held radios.

One full-time day custodian and two evening custodians are assigned to Hollyvale Elementary and work closely with the principal for routine maintenance, daily custodial duties, and special events. Every morning before school begins, the day custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards, graffiti, or other conditions that require removal prior to students and staff entering school grounds. After breakfast and lunch, cafeteria tables are immediately cleaned and the floor is swept. The day custodian checks the restrooms several times throughout the day as a proactive measure in keeping facilities stocked, safe, and sanitary. The evening custodians clean classrooms, desks, restrooms, windows, doors, and floors, and are responsible for set up and take down of equipment and/or furniture for afternoon and evening events.

Hollyvale Elementary works closely with the district's Maintenance & Operations department (M&O) for larger projects, routine facilities maintenance projects, and school inspections. The most recent facilities inspection at Hollyvale Elementary took place on July 23, 2008; no emergency repairs were needed and no unsafe conditions were found. M&O employs a work order process that enables Hollyvale Elementary to communicate unscheduled maintenance needs, urgent repairs, or special projects. Teachers and school staff submit requests to the custodian, an administrator, or office staff who prepares and submits a work order to M&O for resolution. Emergency situations are regularly resolved in one hour or less.

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Planned Improvement

DEFERRED MAINTENANCE

Hesperia Unified School District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program which provides dollar-to-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. During the 2007-08 school year, Hollyvale Elementary received \$33,055 in deferred maintenance funds which were used for asphalt and HVAC improvement projects throughout the campus.

All textbooks used in the core curriculum throughout Hesperia Unified School District are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional Materials for grades K-8 are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. Instructional materials for grades 9-12 are standards-based and approved by the district's Board of Trustees. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials and the eight-year cycle for textbook adoptions in foreign language, visual and performing arts, and health. District textbook review and adoption activities occur the year following the state's adoption. Parents are invited to preview proposed adoptions at the district office for one evening and ten days prior to approval by the school board. On September 9, 2008, the Hesperia Unified School District Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No.2008/09-24 which certifies as required by Education Code section 60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners in the Hesperia Unified School District to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home to study, (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts, (3) sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in foreign language or health classes, and (4) sufficient laboratory science equipment was provided for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-11, inclusive.

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XI. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

Professional Development

This section provides information on how teachers and staff are trained for instructional improvement.

All professional development activities in Hesperia Unified School District revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks and are research-based. Certificated staff build teaching skills and concepts through participation in ongoing training sponsored by the district and school site. During the 2007-08 school year, the district made available one staff development buy-back day and supplemental training involving curriculum, teaching strategies, and methodologies in the content areas of writing and math. Each school site then identifies and coordinates its own staff development activities based upon individual student needs, school site plans, and the district's designated focus areas.

During the 2007-08 school year, Hollyvale Elementary held one staff development buy-back day to begin training in Building Academic Background Knowledge. Staff development topics were selected by the principal, assistant principal, and Staff Council. The school's professional development focuses on Balanced Literacy, Thinking Maps, and Write from the Beginning. Training programs and topics were chosen based upon the school focus and student needs. Results for the California Standardized Tests and district benchmark assessments, teacher feedback, and findings from classroom observations help identify areas for improvement and training programs that will enable teachers to deliver a challenging and rigorous standards-based education fostering student success and proficiency.

The district supplements site-level professional development to follow up and support year-round and ongoing programs centered around the district's focus areas of reading and math. Supplemental professional development is offered throughout the school year on early student release days, during summer vacation, and on weekends. Staff development topics and focus areas are identified and selected based upon input from the district's Professional Development Committee, Principals' Roundtable, and teacher survey results. The Professional Development Committee meets once a year to review student test results from state and district assessments and review teacher survey needs. The Principals' Roundtable provides opportunities for school principals to discuss and share training needs based upon data analysis and classroom observations from each school site.

New teachers receive intensive support and training through the district's Induction Program and New Teachers Academy. For beginning and out-of-state teachers, the district utilized the state Induction Program (formerly known as Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment), a statewide and state-mandated research-based program providing support and skill building through formative assessment and individualized support based on assessment.

The New Teachers Academy sponsors three new teacher orientations each year to support year-round hiring practices; the orientation is a comprehensive overview of the district's policies, school law, ExCEL philosophy, English language learners support, curriculum, instruction, and grade-level and content area specialties.
